

Proposals for the Biography Fair were sent out this week. Students are urged to research their intended choices to make sure there are enough sources for a research paper.

This year for Grandparent's Day the whole school participated in the songfest for our grandparents. Our students worked hard to learn an array of songs to entertain our VIP guests. They also prepared a card and composition about how they honor their grandparents. Hopefully, everyone had an enjoyable day.

Students are making great progress in their Saxon math lessons. Each day students are completing a lesson and learning more about money, counting by 4's, 6's, etc. and complex addition and subtraction. In Spanish they continue to master new words, and practice short dialogues. In Florida History they are learning about our great state and its geography and history. In Zoology students are establishing the big picture of zoology by learning about kingdoms, phylums, orders, classes, etc. to understand the system of classification Linnaeus established so we can categorize and study living things. Students also drew a schematic of the animal kingdom. From this they can see all the various animals we will be studying this year. The students completed the week by celebrating their grandparents and they really enjoyed writing a composition about how to honor them.

Fifth graders were given a lesson on how to write their book report due on September 15th. They are all aware of the increased writing requirement as well as the importance of structure in their writing as well. Students were shown different examples of outlines and brainstorming that can be done when planning a composition. Most of the students have had at least one test in math

and are working diligently in their Saxon math books. In geography students are continuing to work on the anatomy of the Earth, and preparing the upper elementary garden. They also had their first civics test this week.

Sixth graders completed the first chapter in their language book tis week and will move on to learning how to categorize new concepts that they begin to implement into their assignments. Tis will help to improve their writing skills. The first Science test was administered last Friday. Some did very well, but others did not. Some subjects are more challenging than others and require more time to prepare for tests. Science is one of those subjects, and sixth graders might need to begin to study their terms and notes a few days early to be sufficiently prepared. Those students who did not do well on their science test can complete extra credit on page 23. This must be completed by September 11th to receive credit. We would like to congratulate Sarah, Braden, and for receiving the top scores. Please remember the first book My Side of the Mountain is due on the 15th of September; we will review the format for the book report in class, and students can look on page 389 in their language textbook for guidance.
