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PRESCHOOL Mrs. Bermudez

This week in Preschool, the children worked with Valentine's Day themed work. During circle time, the class enjoyed listening and learning new Valentine songs and stories. On the art table, the children are making lots of Valentine crafts. Parents, if you want your child to bring Valentine cards to share with their friends on Valentine's Day (February 14), please send 30 cards with only your child's name on it. Thank you.

During language we introduced 3 part matching with Valentine words. We continued working with sounds, blending sounds, and reading short vowel words. Some of the children are also reading Bob Books daily.

In Math, some of the students had a lesson counting the Decimal System Bead Material. This equipment is to help the child become familiar with the quantities and hierarchies of the decimal system. Other students had lessons with the Stamp Game (Addition). This Montessori material is an activity of color-coded tiles that are designed to represent quantities and teach children mathematical operations in a more abstract way. While some students continue reviewing the sandpaper numbers to learn the names of the numerals by recognizing their written shape (0 to 10).

In Sensorial, the children had various lessons on colors, shapes, sizes, and sequence. During Science the children had lessons on the parts of a fish, snail, and chicken and we continued to learn about the internal organs.

PRIMARY Mrs. Youse and Ms. Lundmark

This week in primary, students honed their story writing skills by using the story dice. These are dice with images on each face that students must incorporate into their stories. This pushes them to think creatively while they are writing. Although some struggle writing original stories, we hope to continue practicing this skill so that they may improve.

The students received a lesson in sensorial work. They learned how to use the smelling jars, which contain two sets of six jars filled with a scent that they must match up.

For science, the students received lesson on the land and water form molds. In the work, students get to label and identify each landform. Afterwards using a measuring cup, blue food coloring, and water they fill each mold to look like the form.

A reminder to families that the science expo is approaching on February 10th. Make sure you are practicing with your child on the information they will be presenting as they can not read off their boards. They need to memorize their presentation just as they did with Biography Fair.

This week the students worked hard on their science expo projects. Each student had several opportunities to stand in front of their classmates to demonstrate, along with talking about the project that they have created.

In spelling the students were able to choose the spelling activity

they wanted to do. Their choices were to write words backwards one time, use stamps, or write sentences.

In math this week the students had a lesson on <, >, or =. They also worked on Geometry cards, booklets, and applications.

Language this week was extension work (reviewing nouns, verbs, articles, and adjectives) and language from the tower. Second graders continue to work on articles, nouns, and verbs. Third grade is working on subject and predicate, types of sentences, suffix, and prefix.

The students continued to work on leaves, plants, stems, and roots.

In history the students continued to work on needs of a man. The students have several extensions on this work that they will be able to start upon completion of their work.

In geography the students worked on weather, clouds, landforms, wetlands, and water forms.

In social studies the students continued to talk about mapping and how to use a key.

The book report is due February 24th.

Due to the Science Expo, no composition topic was assigned this week or next week. We are hoping that this time will be used to prepare for the day of the Expo. Time for practice has been allocated in the afternoons. Afternoon classes will be canceled next week on Wednesday and Thursday, so our students could use the time to get more practice. Some students are struggling with the terminology and should continue their practice over the weekend.

This week fourth graders took a vocabulary test, a math test, and a spelling test. They continue to read the book The Winter People by Joseph Bruchac. The story is about a young Indian brave called Saxso who is fourteen when the British attack his village. It's 1759, and war is raging in the northeast between the British and the French, with the Abenaki people, Saxso's people. Without enough warriors to defend their homes, Saxso's village is burned to the ground. Many people are killed, but some, including Saxso's mother and two sisters, are taken hostage. Now it's up to Saxso, on his own, to track the raiders and bring his family back home . . . before it's too late. Students are also busy preparing for their science fair projects.

This week fifth grade worked on using end punctuation, and knowing how to label direct quotations and dialogue. Students also have turned in their worksheets for the Science Expo. Students received feedback so that they can make any last minute changes before their presentations. Students also are reviewing the regions of the United States in their map skills workbooks. Students will have their book report on a biography of their choice due on February 15th.

This week sixth graders completed their unit on subject and verb agreement. Everyone did very well on the test. They also began the next topic in their textbook on the usage of adjectives and adverbs. In this section, they are learning to use the correct form of modifiers and how to correct errors with modifiers. No projects are due in geography this month; instead sixth graders are working in their new map building skills booklet. In Physical Science they are exploring the phenomenon of buoyancy and buoyant force.
