As we mentioned last week, Upper Elementary has begun their practice for the IOWA Basic Skills Test. The practice tests gave the students a glimpse of what to expect once they begin the actual tests. A review of the rules for punctuating and capitalizing was also given.

Our annual Spelling Bee started on Tuesday when Zain, the third grade champion challenged our fourth graders. Ty'Li and Janie were neck and neck, but at the end Ty'Li prevailed and went on to compete were David won and was also the sixth grade Spelling Bee winner. Congratulations to all the winners! Fourth graders completed work on spelling a vocabulary, and re-wrote a composition on a topic of their own choosing. Students learned about the average, mean, median, mode, and the range of lists of numbers and how to take two part word problems with fractions. This week in fifth grade, students practiced for the IOWA Basic Skills Test. This familiarized students with the exam format. In language, students went through exercises on prefixes and suffixes. In botany, students were placed into groups and assigned one of Florida's iconic trees. Students will work throughout this week and next week on this research project. In geography, students had a review on volcanoes in preparation for their exam this week.

Sixth graders were introduced to the four strike cycle, the diesel engine, and cooling and heating systems this week in Physical Science. In language they are learning to properly punctuate dialogue and will be tested at the end of the unit. Sixth grade is also learning about reference materials.
