America is quickly moving away from the work ethic. As the tentacles of our government on the federal, state and local level grow, our citizens are given more free services and money for choosing not to work. The stated goal is to create equity in our nation, but this will create a large underclass of nonworkers. This large underclass will be easier to control then self-made middleand upper-class entrepreneurs.

Once people are on the government dole, they are easy to manage by the bureaucrats. Dependency on government give-away programs and assistance checks to function will undermine our capitalist economy. Basic needs are covered though the services but dwindle in quality and quantity over time. Reliance on government promises most often ends in disappointment and anger. Once citizens become dependent on government handouts, they are captives of the state.

Most of the immigrants settled in poor ethnic enclaves and worked themselves up into improved living communities. By the third generation most of them were thought of as being full-fledged American citizens.

PRESCHOOL Mrs. Bermudez, Miss Brown

This week in preschool we continued our discussion about North America. At the art table the children stamped North American animals on a map. We also talked about Patriot Day, and the Constitution, and the children got to make a wreath with stars representing the American Flag.

The students were excited to see new fall theme work at the Math and Practical Life areas. They had lessons with odd and even numbers, 1-5, 1 to 10, the teen and ten boards, the short bead stairs, the decimal system, and the 9 tray decimal system. Some of the students are adding with the decimal system. The purpose of the short bead stairs is to assist the children in memorizing the colors of each bead bar and its associated quantity. This is a preliminary activity necessary for more advanced work. The decimal system is to help the child become familiar with the quantities and hierarchies of the decimal system.

In language the children are working with sounds, blending sounds, working with the pink series (short vowels), reading sentences or reading Bob Books. The children are also encouraged to practice their penmanship twice a week.

PRIMARY

This week in primary, the students were introduced to several new materials and lessons. For math, they learned the teen frame and ten boards. These will introduce them to the tens digit and numbers past ten. Jace mastered his subtraction, so he will be moving on to multiplication. The children continued to get their spelling tests, with Donovan joining since has shown appropriate mastery of his penmanship and phonetic understanding to begin this week. For language, the children copied a poem about an apple tree and illustrated a picture for it. We also discussed grammar; about where and when to use capital letters.

In science, the students are learning botany. They've been given lessons on parts of plants, leaves, and trees. To test that they have learned these concepts, we are introducing tests where they must color each part if the plant differently according to what we tell them. This will test both their understanding of the material and their listening abilities.

LOWER ELEMENTARY Mrs. Urbanek and Mr. Garrand

Proposals for the Biography Fair went out last week. Time should be dedicated to researching different historical figures and deciding who to portray for the Biography Fair. Please make sure there are enough reliable sources at your child's level. This is the first step in preparing for the presentation. Once a historical figure is chosen, a proposal is submitted and will need to be approved by the teacher. Proposals should be submitted as soon as possible to avoid having to choose someone else. Proposals are approved on a first-come, first-served basis.

The fourth graders this week took a spelling test for lesson 4, turned in their first book report on the charming book "Because of WinnDixie" They also wrote their final drafts of their second composition of the year about a heroic act. Many more language towers were completed as well as reviewing and learning verbs, and pronouns.

The students are making great progress in Saxon math and have now completed their first math test and are working on lessons that increase their knowledge of negative numbers, how to use the 100's table and many more fun math functions.

In zoology the students learned about the 7 basic functions that all living things do: excretion, respiration, growth, feeding, senses. Then they compared how plants do these functions compared to how animals do them. In geography they continue to learn about the continents. This week we learned more about Europe, Asia, Africa, and Australia.

Several of the fourth graders have volunteered to help with cleanup after lunch. They sweep under the tables, spray down the tabes, water plants and tidy the back porches. They are doing a smashing job! It was another fun week filling minds with interesting facts and learning to accomplish new tasks and master new concepts.

This week fifth graders turned in their first book report. Students will not have another book report until after the Biography Fair so they can focus on their chosen historical figure. In language, subjects and predicates were re-introduced and reviewed. In math, we are still emphasizing neatness when turning in homework. Students are doing well reviewing previous concepts that they learned last year. In Geography, students continued working on command cards about the anatomy of the Earth. In Botany, students learned about the differences between fibrous roots and taproot systems.

Sixth graders had their first language test on the structure of a sentence. Many students did very well, so we would like to congratulate them for doing a wonderful job! They will have their third science on Monday, September 19th and should use the weekend to prepare accordingly. Key Terms and their definitions should be written on index cards. Suggestions were given when reviewing for the test to underline important words in the definitions to help memorize the terms. Sixth graders also wrote their first synopsis of the novel, Black Beauty on Thursday. The structure of a well written book report was reviewed, and an example of a book report and guidelines can be found in their language book on page 398. The next book report will be due on Friday. September 30th.
