PUNISHMENT AND DISCIPLINE ARE BEING CANCELLED By Domenick J. Maglio PhD. Traditional Realist

There has been a radical shift in our 'woke" culture of the United States. It began with Dr. Benjamin Spock, an avowed socialist communist who changed our traditional childrearing practices. They changed from those derived from the Bible to permissive materialism proposed in his book, Baby and Child Care, published in 1946. This philosophy removed punishment and discipline from the childrearing equation. 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PRESCHOOL Mrs. Bermudez, Miss Brown

This week in preschool, the students are learning about the life cycle of the pumpkin. In Practical Life the children learned how to clean a pumpkin (it's shining!!!) to get it ready for carving. During circle time the children had to vote on its name and how it is going to look.

In math the children had a lesson with the Teen Frame. The Montessori Teen Hanging Bead Frame allows children to build the teen numbers by hanging the corresponding pair of colored beads on hooks. For example, to build the number '14' a child would use a 10-bar (gold) and then add 4-bar (yellow) to create the number. This material can help reinforce the following skills: number recognition, linear counting, place value, and fine motor activity as well. Others had a lesson with the Addition Strip Board. This material helps children memorize their addition facts.

In language the children are working with sounds, blending sounds, working with the pink series (short vowels), reading sentences, or reading Bob Books. Congratulations to Lincoln, Brock and Kyrii they are now reading Bob Books!

During Geography the children had a quick review on the continents and the United States. During music the children are learning Patriotic songs for Veteran's Day.

PRIMARY Mrs. Youse and Ms. Lundmark

This week we began to practice for the Biography Fair. We have seen improvement in the students' public speaking. We have been working on eye contact, posture, and enunciation. We will continue practicing next week. Remember, Bio Fair is a half day for students. The parade will begin at 11 AM and dismissal will be at 11:30 from the front porch. If you decide your child will stay, remember to send a snack and a lunch with your child.

For math, the students had a lesson on The Golden Beads: and introduction to the Decimal System. This was a review for some children, and a new lesson for others. The children learn from concrete to abstract, combining the golden beads with the abstract color coded numerals, building their association of quantity and symbol. The Tray of Nines-Beads from 1 through 1000 (9 units, 9 tens, 9 hundreds, 1 thousand) was also introduced. This activity is sometimes called the Exchange Tray. It teaches the child that 10 units are the same as one ten, that 10 tens are the same as one hundred, and that ten hundreds are the same as one thousand.

At the art table, the children painted a jack-o-lantern. We have begun practicing songs for the upcoming Veteran's Day celebration.

With the last weekend coming up before the Biography Fair, all students should be practicing their presentations for the big day. We will begin practicing in class next week, so everyone should be prepared to present. Although display boards are not required for this fair, if a student is using one, it must be part of their presentation, so they should practice using their board.

This week fourth grade completed another spelling test/unit and has been focusing on the use of a topic sentence in writing a paragraph. They continue to move steadily forward in the Saxon math book, and they all took tests this week so you should see the score card coming home for you to sign. All students benefit from being outside and so two days out of the week they spend time working on their vertebrates and invertebrates booklet via scavenger hunts. On the other days the students are mastering the seas, oceans, bays, and straits around the world and the famous landmarks. A big thank you to Ms. Brown for the recorder lessons which all the fourth graders love.

This week fifth graders continued to learn their map vocabulary terms and how to locate landmarks using latitude and longitude coordinates. Students also have continued to measure their Golden Pothos' growth. At this stage, most are witnessing root development. Students were given another lesson on how to write their bibliographies for the Biography Fair, and tips for giving their presentations next week.

This week sixth graders continued their exploration of the periodic table and the classification of its elements. They are learning how the periodic table is arranged and how to identify all of its parts. Properties of metals and nonmetals are also being discussed. Sixth graders will begin their United States project. Each student will adopt a state and will create a poster with important information about their chosen state. This project was designed to help them learn and teach each other about

the U.S. states through their research and presentations.

PRESCHOOL AFTER SCHOOL Ms. Brewer

During circle time this week, we read a book called "The Ocean and Who Lives in It'. The children learned about two-thirds of the earth is covered by salty sea water. "Ocean" is the term we give to these large areas of water. They also learned all the different animals that live deep down, near the ocean floor. For example, the crab, seahorse, eel, octopus, shark, the flying fish who has fins just like wings, and the blue whale which is the largest animal in the world. We also did an exercise with alphabet and numbers flash cards. All the children had a turn giving their answers when an alphabet math card was shown. The children did great!

On the playground, one child decided to be the bus driver and some children were the passengers while singing Wheels On The Bus song. Once back in the classroom, the children worked with puzzles, board games, legos, and any activity of their choice.

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Many states do not have an automatic death sentence for killing a police officer.
