Sensorial material is based on a logical learning sequence, progressing from the concrete to the abstract. The materials provide indirect preparation for intellectual life. They refine the senses and develop cognitive skills such as thinking, judging, associating and comparing. Children develop powers of observation such as attention and concentration.

Soon we will start making parentteacher meetings to let you know how your child is doing and what we can do to help your child succeed. We are looking forward to a very productive year!

# PRIMARY Miss Finnerty and Ms Wallace

Thank you for a wonderful second week. We continued to go over our classroom and safety rules. We emphasized that it is important for them to take care of the materials and each other in order for them to learn.

This week, we began introducing spelling lists. All first graders and kindergarteners were given spelling lists. Children will be given spelling lists that are appropriate for the level they are at. This can change and they may move up as the year progresses.

Kindergarteners who do not currently have a spelling list will gain them during the year as they master writing fundamentals.

Their morning routine consists of spelling, Language, and math. Work in these areas must be completed before a child can engage in afternoon work.

The kindergarteners will continue to master the basics in language. Basics such as matching pictures to their phonetic sounds and identifying consonant-vowel-consonant words. The first graders will work on more challenging language, such as consonant blends and compound words. In math, students were given a lesson on short bead stairs and units. First graders are continuing to memorize their addition, subtraction, and multiplication facts. At recess, we began introducing structured play. They worked on catching and throwing a ball and how to run a relay race. The children are also working on learning songs for Grandparents Day on September 8th. They are excited to perform and show their appreciation for all they do.

This week in spelling the students have been introduced to their first spelling list. The new spelling words go home every Friday and the test is the following Friday.

In History the students are learning about the Native American, beginning with the needs for clothing.

In science the students have had a lesson on the different parts of the mammal. The students will use the materials, match the three cards, write, draw, research, and label each picture.

In Geography the students are working on the Continents. They have different types of continent animals they will label and color the continent with the proper color.

In Math the students are working with geometry cards and they have also started working in math booklets. The students received a new lesson on applications, which are story problems. They are practicing their times tables. They will have times tables for homework every weekend.

In Language the second grade students are using materials from the tower, matching, and then writing. They are currently learning the different animal sounds, homes, groups, and young. The third grade students are working from the tower starting with plurals to refresh their memory from last year.

We ask that you try to get your child to class by 8:20 so they are ready for class to start on time. When a child is late they miss important lessons that are given in the morning.

UPPER ELEMENTARY

The Upper Elementary Calendar will not be available on the Wider Horizons' website this year, but will be sent home with our students on September 1st. Please refer to the calendar for composition topics, book reports, spelling and vocabulary test dates, and holidays.

The fourth graders this week reviewed plural nouns, common and proper nouns, and adjectives. All students have worked hard to earn the privilege of taking their Saxon Math book home. To do this each student needs to complete 64 problems correctly in 2 minutes of both addition and multiplication. Congratulations to all who have accomplished this this week. In zoology, students are learning about the five kingdoms and are learning taxonomic rank. In Geography, students were introduced to the southeast region of the United States.

The fifth graders began working in their spelling books and took their first spelling and vocabulary test. Students were given a review on how to write compound and compound complex sentences, so that they can improve upon their writing. In math, students began to review some of the concepts that they learned in previous years such as sequence patterns and digits. For botany, students learned about the five main characteristics of plants. In geography, they learned about landforms along coastlines, both regular and irregular. They will be tested next week. Students adapted well to the increased length of their compositions and have really put effort into finding their writer's voice in this first composition.

Sixth graders completed chapter one in physical science and will take their first test on Friday, August 25th. Before the test they completed a lab where they utilized several tools such as: the meter stick, the celsius thermometer, the graduated cylinder and the triple beam balance to find length, temperature, volume, and mass

of various items. In language, sixth grade learned to identify the subject and the predicate in different kinds of sentences. They are also learning geographic terms and are exploring the world map. They will soon learn to use the lines of latitude and

longitude to find specific locations on a map.

JUNIOR HIGH AND HIGH SCHOOL Mrs. Youse, Ms. Sanchez, Ms. Wheeler

After a very successful first week back at school, we are now fully in the swing of things for a rewarding new year. The older students have been setting a very good example for the younger students and we are confident that our environment is set up for the continued success of all of us.

The seventh grade students have adapted nicely to their new classroom and have begun learning proper behavior and classroom etiquette from their teachers, upperclassmen, and classmates. They are adjusting to their new role and routine very well. They have learned that they are expected to be kind, use time wisely, display interest in the current lesson, ask questions, and complete all work that is assigned to them.

The eight grade students have continued building upon the important values and behaviors they learned in the classroom last year. In Literature, they are reading Skeleton Key by Anthony Horowitz, in which the orphaned 14 year old spy Alex Rider uncovers a plot unfolding at Wimbledon. They have demonstrated high level understanding of the content and the ability to grasp thematic elements as well as context clues for future plot points.

The ninth grade students are rapidly approaching our first exams on multiple subjects. In American History, they are learning about such concepts as how various Native American cultures compare and contrast. In Physical Science, we have discussed how technology impacts scientific advancement. We have also covered important basics such as laboratory safety and interpreting data.

The tenth grade students are continuing their mastery of different subjects. In financial literacy, they are learning about the state minimum wage and the intricacies of budgeting for the many different facets of adult life. They have used the Internet to explore the cost of housing, personal care, transportation, and utilities. We have already had several eye opening discussions about
